QUESTION TAGS

BUSINESS ENGLISH

WHAT IS A QUESTION TAG?

Helps you to confirm the information

To double-check something

It is the opposite form of the main sentence:

If the sentence is positive, question tag is negative;

If the sentence is negative, question tag is positive

PRESENT TENSES - QUESTION TAGS

PRESENT SIMPLE (auxiliary verb: DO/DOES)

Positive QT: Peter likes spaghetti, doesn't he?

Negative QT: They don't work at this company, do they?

PRESENT CONTINUOUS (auxiliary verb: AM/IS/ARE)

Positive QT: Jennifer is studying at the moment, isn't she?

Negative QT: We aren't walking, are we?

PRESENT TENSES - QUESTION TAGS

PRESENT PERFECT (auxiliary verb: have/has)

Positive QT: Harry has lived in NY for a long time, hasn't he?

Negative QT: We haven't visited our friends in Chicago this year, have we?

PAST TENSES – QUESTION TAGS

PAST SIMPLE (auxiliary verb: DID)

Positive QT: Jack bought a new house, didn't he?

Negative QT: I didn't leave my wallet at home, did I?

PAST TENSES - QUESTION TAGS

PAST CONTINUOUS (auxiliary verb: WAS/WERE)

Positive QT: Andy was working when you arrived, wasn't he?

Negative QT: They weren't waiting for you, were they?

PAST PERFECT (auxiliary verb: HAD)

Positive QT: They had finished before he arrived, hadn't they?

Negative QT: Jason hadn't already finished before you provided the update, had he?

FUTURE TENSES - QUESTION TAGS

FUTURE SIMPLE - WILL (auxiliary verb: WILL)

Positive QT: Tom will think about it, won't he?

Negative QT: They won't be able to come to the party, will they?

FUTURE - GOING TO (auxiliary verb: AM/IS/ARE)

Positive QT: Tom is going to study Russian, isn't he?

Negative QT: They aren't going to be at the meeting, are they?

OTHER EXAMPLES WITH QUESTION TAG

IMPERATIVE SENTENCES: when telling/ordering somebody to do something or not to do something, use → WILL YOU

Example: Give me that file, will you?

SENTENCES WITH 'I':

Example: I am always right, AREN'T I? (NOT AMN'T I)

WHAT TO WATCH FOR WHEN USING QUESTION TAG?

The TENSE of the sentence

The type of the main verb (TO BE or OTHER)

Is the sentence affirmative or negative?
